Saturday, February 11, 2017:

Beginning Birding 101 at the Savannah National Wildlife Refuge – is offered in collaboration with Ogeechee Audubon, US Fish and Wildlife, and Marine Extension & Georgia Sea Grant. This is a new program to introduce those who are interested in birding but do not know where to start. There will be experienced birders to assist with bird guides, identification apps for cell phones, binoculars and spotting scopes. On completion of this program, you will be able to operate binoculars, learn how to use a spotting scope, categorize a few birds by shape of the body and identify several bird habitats. Loaner binoculars will be available. This program is FREE and open to the public, however it is limited to 10 people. Meet at the Savannah National Wildlife Refuge at 9am. Friday, February 17 to Monday, February 20:

The Great Backyard Bird Count _- a fun, free and easy event that engages bird watchers of all ages. The GBBC provides a real time snapshot of bird populations. Participants are asked to count birds for as little as 15 minutes on one or more days during the four day event. Report your sightings on-line at birdcount.org. Anyone can take part in the Great Backyard Bird Count, from beginning birders to experts, and you can participate from the comfort of your own backyard!

Field Trip Report: November 19, 2016

On Saturday morning, twenty birders assembled inside The Reserve, a partially built-out housing development on Savanah's Hutchinson Island. The large number of undeveloped lots has been allowed to grow up into fairly dense weeds, making this area a "mini-Serengeti" for grassland species that are otherwise hard-pressed to find suitable habitat in the metro area.

Leader Steve Wagner led the group across a field of waist-high vegetation where we succeeded in flushing up house wrens, ruby-crowned kinglets, gray catbirds, palm warblers, eastern phoebes, and song and Savannah sparrows. A walk along the edge of the wooded area produced hermit thrush, many yellow-rumped and one black-and-white warblers, a loggerhead shrike, and stellar looks at several vesper sparrows, among numerous other species.

Although we searched in vain for a Lincoln's sparrow seen here on an earlier date, we were rewarded instead with two very handsome and active western kingbirds perched on street signs and busy hawking insects on the adjacent lawns. This is a species that is supposed to stay well west of the Mississippi in summer and head to Central America in winter. But apparently, these birds "didn't get the memo" and were enjoying the perfect habitat and abundant flying insects on Hutchinson Island.

Our final stop was to check the brush pile adjacent to the Hutchinson Island race course, where we discovered that Hurricane Matthew had transformed the brush PILE into a brush MILE!...to the delight of wrens, catbirds, and sparrows. Thank you, Steve, for leading a very satisfying field trip.
