Noise Pollution and its Effects on Humans and Wildlife

Speaker: Russ Wigh

Russ has been a birder since 1979; and after retirement in 1999, and a subsequent move to The Landings in 2001, birds became all consuming. But it was trips to Costa Rica and annual get-a-way visits to remote Arizona that cemented his interest in field sound recording and an awareness of just how noisy our world is.

In this program Russ will give us an introduction to noise pollution, and its harmful impact on humans and wildlife. Human quality of life has diminished and we have been subconsciously conditioned to tolerate noise as a part of everyday life without realizing its impacts on our health and hearing.

Ecosystems and wildlife diversity in urban and suburban environments have been altered as noise averse species have declined leaving only those which can still tolerate and communicate in spite of the noise pollution.

SAT, FEB 9: Savannah National Wildlife Refuge - Tupelo Trail 8:00 am to 11:00

<u>am</u>, established in 1927, the refuge encompasses over 30,000 acres of freshwater marshes, tidal rivers and creeks, including bottomland hardwoods. Hike the lower portion of the Tupelo Trail, which travels along levee tops and affords great views of the north impoundments. We will be looking for wintering waterfowl, waders, rails, raptors and sparrows. Meet at Savannah National Wildlife Refuge Tupelo Trailhead parking lot (Across from the Laurel Hill Wildlife Drive exit). **Trip Vigor:** Moderate with a lot of walking. **Leader:** Mary Lou Dickson, 919-559-6898, marylou@dicksonimages.com.

SUN, FEB 17: The Great Backyard Bird Count field trip at Solomon Tract 8:00 am to 12 noon. The Great Backyard Bird Count is an annual event to collect data about birds, to determine changes in populations, and migration trends. In celebration, we are offering a field trip at Solomon Tract. Solomon tract is a portion of the Savannah NWR. This is a heavily wooded site with upland and bottomland hardwoods, Ducks а impoundment, and a couple of open fields. Target species include rails, bitterns, sparrows, wintering warblers, and ducks. Meet at entrance. Trip Vigor: Moderate, with a lot of walking on uneven ground. SUN, FEB 24: Savannah Christian Preparatory School, 1599 Chatham Pkwy 2:30pm to 6pm. Rusty Blackbirds have become a species of major conservation concern, as their numbers have inexplicably plummeted over the past few decades. And yet, here in Savannah, we have been identifying a growing number of locations that seemingly

harbor significant populations of these mysterious blackbirds. Join Stan Gray, who has been studying Rusties at this amazing wintering "megasite" for the past seven (7) years, as we observe what is possibly the largest population of Rusty Blackbirds frequenting the southeast coast. But that is just one aspect of these intriguing school grounds, which are surrounded by countless acres of freshwater wetlands, ponds, and hardwood forests. Welcomed by the school administration to bird this private school property on weekends, Ogeechee Audubon will explore the nature sanctuary affectionately known to the school as "Eden". Help us look for ways to increase our partnership with SCPS, as we aim to enhance the awareness and elicit the participation of the next generation of conservationists. We hope this field trip will encourage more birders to enjoy Savannah Christian Preparatory School regularly as a birding destination, and add to our avian knowledge of it, for the school's benefit. Harris Neck Christmas Bird Count Circle Field Report

Thirty-four (34) intrepid, die-hard birders defied the ominous weather forecast to participate in the annual

Harris Neck Christmas Bird Count on Friday, December 14, 2018. Faced with an all-day rain forecast, 14 teams nonetheless took to their assigned routes and made the best of a bleak situation. Two teams of boaters even spent hours in choppy, wind-blown conditions to ensure the dominant waters of the count circle were properly represented. Despite road



conditions making access impossible to numerous sites, and a storm prediction which necessitated the cancellation of the late-PM roost count, the teams miraculously recorded 130 bird species, a number better than in even some good weather years. Particularly impressive were the numbers of the three species of marsh sparrows observed, and the large numbers of

shorebirds sequestered in sheltered areas. We can only imagine what this fine group of volunteers could accomplish in better conditions. Until the next count! Mark your calendars for Friday, December 20. Stan Gray

He knew the area well and was very knowledgeable himself. The morale of this story - sit back, relax, enjoy life, and see what happens. (Although we did miss the chili lunch at the visitor center by about 30 minutes!!!)
